New Electric Rates Taking Effect Feb. 1, 2026

During an open meeting on Nov. 17, Midwest Energy's Board of Directors approved electric rate changes to go into effect Feb. 1, 2026. The rates see the average residential customer's bill increase annually an average of 5.4 percent, or just over \$6 per month, each year over three years. Some rate classes will see larger bill impacts than others.

Two rate groups, General Service Medium and Standard Irrigation (M System), would see slight decreases in average bills.

Also notable in this rate case is the renaming of several line items on all customer bills, which do not affect

rates. Today's "Customer Charge" becomes "Electric Fixed Delivery Charge," while the "Demand Charge" splits to become "Generation Demand Charge" and "Delivery Demand Charge." The Energy Charge is also split, with "Energy Delivery Charge" added. These changes follow updates to Kansas tax statutes in 2023, which allows separately itemized delivery charges to be removed from the taxable basis for Kansas sales tax. These bill changes will save Midwest Energy customers roughly \$2.5 million per year every year, without changing customer rates. For more information, visit our website at www.mwenergy.com.

Three New Directors Elected to Midwest Energy Board

Election results for the 2025 Board of Directors election were announced at Midwest Energy's Annual Meeting in October. Three new board members were elected.

Christian Wilson of Colby was seated for District 1. A native of Colby, Mr. Wilson is the Executive of Operations for Frahm Farmland, Inc., responsible for strategic leadership and day-to-day

farm management. He holds a bachelor's degree from Fort Hays State University, and a master's in agribusiness from Kansas State University.

Chad Ringwald of Ellinwood was seated for District 3. A fifth-generation farmer in Rice County, he is a partner in TriAg Farms, a family farm that has been in central Kansas for 130 years. He attended Kansas State University, majoring in agribusiness.

Kerry Froetschner of Rozel was seated for District 5. Mr. Froetschner is a fourth-generation farmer, operating

a family farm and ranch in Pawnee County. He serves on several farm and co-op boards, including Big Bend Groundwater Management District No. 5 Board, and the Pawnee County Co-op Association and Golden Plains Co-op Boards.

Midwest Energy's Board

has nine members. The three new Board members join two other relative newcomers, Judy Thurman of Hays, seated in 2024, and Emily Campbell of Hoxie, seated in 2023.

Youth Tour Trip, Scholarship Applications Open

Midwest Energy is now accepting applications for the 2026 Youth Tour Trip and Scholarships.

awarding 18 high school seniors with \$1,000 scholarships to a secondary education program of their choice. These awards will be paid directly to the student. The eligibility criteria is the same as the trip, but

the scholarships are only available to high school seniors.

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ENERGY EFFICIENCY TIP OF THE MONTH

To maximize your fireplace's efficiency, always keep the damper closed when the fireplace is not in use. An open damper is like an open window, allowing warm indoor air to escape and cold air to enter. Consider installing a fireplace insert, which improves heat output by circulating warm air into the room rather than letting it escape up the chimney. Also, burn only seasoned hardwood to ensure a hotter, cleaner burn. Regularly clean and inspect your chimney to maintain safe and efficient operation.
